COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS:

This course introduces students to classic stories in the modern Jewish literary canon through close reading, reflection, discussion, interpretation, evaluation, comparison, and analysis, providing students with a conceptual framework for understanding and deriving aesthetic pleasure and cultural understanding from these vivid stories.

Students will gain exposure to translated fictional works originally written in Hebrew, Yiddish, German, Russian and English by prominent Jewish authors. Through their study, students will learn how the breakdown of pre-modern Jewish society, immigration, the challenges of Jewish integration and exclusion, and the establishment of new Jewish communities, influenced the creation of this literature.
