**COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

Welcome to Gender and Society! In this course, we will learn how social institutions and lived experiences in the United States are organized and influenced by gender. The underlying premise of this course is that gender is a socially constructed idea. However, it has real consequences of marginalization for people's lives and lived experiences. Through readings, lectures, discussions, films, and reflection, we will explore how gender operates in various institutions such as religion, family, schools, legal systems, and the workplace. We will also learn about how the inequalities that arise in these institutions are consequences of a society stratified by gender. Lastly, we will investigate how gender is implicated in a variety of lived experiences such as romantic relationships, disability, violence, technology and science, and health and illness. Together, we will use peer reviewed social science literature, survey data, fictional and non-fictional literature, and popular media to explore and analyze gender's influence on and implications for society from a sociological perspective.
