COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS:

This workshop is designed for all students who wish to reinforce and perfect their knowledge of French while focusing on the most relevant themes in the business world. Students are introduced to the cultural, social, and administrative realities of the French/francophone business world. Through a functional simulation that involves them, students are trained to face common situations of written and oral professional communication in French and create a mock start-up. The workshop is conducted mostly (if not entirely) in French.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of this Workshop in Professional French, students will be able to:

- recognize, understand, and use oral and written professional communication functions in French
- situate and define the general context of the cultural, social, and administrative realities of the French/francophone business world
- have "authentic" oral and written professional exchanges in French and interact with French / francophone cultures through a functional simulation

• expand their international cultural knowledge, competencies, and skills in French to increase their global competitiveness

PREREQUISITES/RECOMMENDED BACKGROUND:
