IN THE CLASSROOM

SOCL 2000 - Qualitative Research Methods



Dr. Anna Muraco built her Spring '24 class, SOCL 2000 Qualitative Research Methods, around a collaborative research project with students in the course to understand how current LMU students' learning and social needs were affected by the Covid-19 pandemic. The class designed the study, wrote interview questions, received IRB approval, and collected interview data from 47 LMU students. For their final semester projects, students are analyzing the interview data and Dr. Muraco will share some of the findings with the department and BCLA faculty. Dr. Muraco plans to continue using this project in future courses to collect additional data and ultimately, she hopes to publish an article about the findings.

SOCL 3230 - Applied Community Internship

Clinical Assistant Professor, Dr. Nathan Sessoms course, SOCL 3230 Applied Community Internship, matches students as interns with community-based organizations in South Los Angeles. In the course, students learn about historical and contemporary South LA, while building upon their existing knowledge of social inequalities, urban community dynamics, and the various anti-racist strategies that partnering organizations employ to create more equitable conditions. Students intern with the organizations for 6-8 hours per week for several weeks during the semester. Additionally, students attend a field trip to various locations in Los Angeles and discuss many of the common challenges associated with providing critical services and resources to community members and community institutions. This course is being taught again in Fall 2024.

Dr. Jim Faught

Professor Jim Faught is a LMU Sociology Department legend, starting and ending his teaching career at the same academic institution over a span of 50 years. The two most important experiences in his life that helped mold and develop his self-confidence to succeed in his career were the army and baseball.






Jim was born in 1942 during the war years in Visalia, CA. He had a passion for studying geography books and maps with his uncle and enjoyed reading the Willie and Joe WWII books by Bill Malden together. These experiences with his uncle grew his interest in the military and just two weeks after his high school graduation, he enlisted in the army. While at basic training at Fort Ord, he

was asked to become a cryptographer – someone who writes or cracks the encryption code used for data security. This position required top secret clearance and extensive FBI background checks. Once completed, he received a cryptographic clearance and a cosmic top secret (NATO requirement) clearance. Jim served three years in the army as a cryptographer.

Jim's favorite sport is baseball. At 13 years old, he was selected to play for a Babe Ruth team which ended up winning the southern Santa Clara Valley championship and he was named MVP of the tournament. Even at the early age of 13, Jim was recognized by the head coach of Santa Clara University for his playing ability. Not only did Jim play highly competitive baseball but he was also the quarterback of his high school team.



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Happy Retirement!

Professor Faught received his BA and master's degree in social science at San Jose State University. He moved on to receive his Ph.D. at the University of Notre Dame on scholarship. He accepted a job from LMU in 1974 in the Sociology Department (after declining a post-doctoral fellowship at the University of Virginia) and has been here at LMU ever since.

Jim has achieved many accomplishments over the years. He received 4 awards from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), been the recipient of 6 summer research grants, and was published in The Sociological Quarterly, Sociological Perspectives, Journal of Urban Affairs, Journal of Classical Sociology, The British

Journal of Sociology, Atzlan, Qualitative Sociology, and The American Sociologist. He also held the position of department chair for a total of 15 years. Jim's favorite course he taught was Social Stratification and his most enjoyable teaching experience was in the London Study Abroad Program where the students were exceptional.

Professor Faught will be retiring after the Spring '24 semester. He is excited to see more of his two grandchildren who live in the Bay Area and maybe become involved in something baseball related. He also has a few items of the shelf that are waiting to be edited.

Jim, we thank you for your 50 years of dedication to LMU, the Sociology Department and to your students. We wish you well in your retirement and you will be missed in the department.
