


At this point in the semester, what experiences should students seek to help them decide on a potential major?

As we approach the end of October and the start of November, events wind up right before they wind down in mid-November. Therefore, students ought to attend events now to continue to build their knowledge of what's out there. Obtaining more information can help students broaden and deepen their understanding of the opportunities that await them and how their academic studies can take them towards their goals.

There are a variety of info sessions and workshops hosted on campus by the many departments, organizations, and colleges of LMU. Leverage those opportunities and events as listed in the earlier sections of this newsletter.

What actions can students take to help them on their decision-making path?

The first step would be to **make a list of jobs that seem interesting**. This list can be as short or as long as the students wishes.

The next step is **seek out people who hold such roles**. Look first at the network that already exists on campus. Are there certain staff or faculty who have an interesting job? Seek out opportunities to talk to those professionals. Next, tap into the LMU alum network. It is large and alums can be located on both <u>LinkedIn</u> and in <u>The Pride</u>. Using the same method as connecting with LMU faculty and staff, reaching out to an alum starts with expressing curiosity in that alum's work.

Students can also use CPD's <u>informational interviewing</u> tips to learn how to go about connecting with others to gather insight about different careers and career paths.
