COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS:

- No matter how much we may try, we cannot escape it. The climate crisis is upon us and anxiety surrounding the future of our planet seems to be growing day by day. But beyond alarming facts and figures, beyond the din of climate deniers, what is the role of poetry in all of this? Specifically, how can an investigation of African, Indigenous, and Afro-Indigenous eco-poetics better equip us to tackle the climate crisis, *creatively?* Moreover, what are the spiritual, cultural, and sociological intersections made possible by these investigations? Throughout this semester we will interrogate these large questions and many more through thoughtful inquiry, reflection, and dialogue.
- With these thematic frameworks in mind, this semester's mission is deceptively simple: to create new, experimental, and thought-provoking work. Like the university's ethos of educating the whole person, this course aims to educate the whole writer, with more attention paid to process over product. As such, we will analyze texts that highlight each step of the writing process including but not limited to ideation, drafting, revision, and performance.
