COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS:

Using American films and short stories about the Holocaust, this class will examine how the disciplines of film and literature explore the shaping of the American consciousness about the European catastrophe. Key to these interpretations are the role of culture, art and society in creating the conditions for how America understood, and continues to understand, the Holocaust, an event that took place on a distant continent but which still carries worldwide reverberations.
