COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS:

The nonhuman is all around us, from nonhuman nature (tigers, trees, rivers) to the built environment (cars, shoes, skyscrapers) to the technological and biotechnological nonhuman (AI, robots, clones). But how do we represent the nonhuman in our writing, when we ourselves are human, and limited to human language? This course explores this paradoxical question, looking at both short fiction and novel-length works that focus on the nonhuman, with several that fully delve into the nonhuman point of view. Over the course of the semester, you will write two pieces of short fiction that will be workshopped by the class in a supportive, encouraging environment. In taking this class, you should be excited about experimenting with your writing and taking risks with your prose, workshopping your peers' work, and reading and studying examples of the nonhuman by writers including Kazuo Ishiguro, Ursula K. LeGuin, Talia Lakshmi Kolluri, and Karen Russell. Additionally, we will read secondary work on the theories of the nonhuman/posthuman; the class will also include a session on getting your work out in the world, with information on submitting short fiction to literary journals.
