COURSE DESCRIPTION/ PRINCIPAL TOPICS:

This course is designed for students with little to no prior experience in Mandarin Chinese and is the first of a series of Chinese language and culture courses. Students develop communicative skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) and cross-cultural competency from the Novice-low to the Novice-mid level. This course requires a weekly 30-minute drill session.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of the required coursework, students will be able to:

- Recognize, pronounce, and annotate Chinese characters using the *pinyin* Romanization system;
- Recognize and write characters and words studied in the course;
- Maintain face-to-face short conversations on topics such as greetings, family, dates and times, hobbies, and visiting friends;
- Correctly form sentences using essential grammatical structures both verbally and in writing.
- Write compositions of about 100 characters using correct punctuation and formatting.

PREREQUISITES/RECOMMENDED BACKGROUND:

LMU Placement Exam required. This course is for students with little to no experience in Mandarin Chinese.

- Be able to understand some authentic texts that serve a functional purpose, such as signs, public announcements, and short instructions.
- Write median-length essays of different genres.

COURSE DESCRIPTION/ PRINCIPAL TOPICS

This course prepares students for the business world in contemporary China by developing their linguistic proficiency and cultural understanding in a business context. Building upon their elementary communication skills in Chinese, students focus on contemporary usage of business Chinese in speaking and writing, Chinese business culture and customs, and preparation for working and living in China. It adopts a task-based approach and engages students in using Chinese in simulated business-related activities. This course fulfills the Chinese minor requirement as an upper-division elective.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Use Chinese to communicate in essential business scenarios;
- Understand the etiquette, customs, and culture specific to the Chinese business context and appropriately apply this understanding in business interactions;
- Become linguistically and culturally familiar with working in the Chinese business sector and living in China;
- Describe and discuss with knowledge the macro business environment in today's China;
- Develop and articulate a college student's aspiration as a future business leader committed to promoting strong commercial relationships between the U.S. and China.

COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS

In this interdisciplinary course, students critically examine the traditions and transformations of Chinese culinary practices with thoughtful consideration of relevant historical, cultural, and global-local contexts. Readings and discussions make up the majority of the class time, but several class periods will be devoted to fieldtrips in LA's culinary communities and making and sharing of food.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the course, students will be able to (1) describe the culinary diversity of traditional Chinese cuisine with reference to cultural geography, (2) evaluate and articulate the similarities and differences between Chinese cuisine and a non-Chinese food tradition that they are familiar with, (3) explain the philosophical perspectives reflected in Chinese culinary practices with specific examples, (4) outline the major developments in the history of Chinese-American food, (5) create one or two traditional or new Chinese dishes.

COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS

This course engages students in inquiries into the ever-evolving concept of "Chineseness" in historical and global-local contexts. Rooted in the linguistic and cultural diversity of China and is thus in itself complex, the idea of "what is Chinese" has been shaped and reshaped by global influences since China and the West came into sustained contact in the 13th century. In this interdisciplinary course, students will study a broad range of topics with the main objective to develop their intercultural curiosity and competence, critical thinking skills, and global-local perspectives about China and the world. The course consists of four units: Chinese languages, cultures, and philosophy, China and Europe (13th-20th centuries), China and the Americas (19th-21st centuries), and Chinese diaspora cultures in the globalized world (20th-21st centuries).

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the course, students will be able to (1) describe the linguistic diversity of China and explain the concepts of "modern Chinese culture" and "diaspora Chinese cultures"; (2) articulate the meaning of the Confucian concepts of rén and lı and the Daoist idea of wúwéi and apply these concepts to analyzing historical events and personal experiences in cross-cultural contexts; (3) evaluate the major outcomes in the cultural exchanges between China and Europe from the 13th to the 19th century; (4) delineate the main issues in the Chinese immigration experience to the Americas, Oceania, and Africa from the 19th to the 21st century; (5) evaluate representations of Chineseness and construction of Chinese identities in global culture; (6) analyze local issues within global contexts by identifying ways in which localities and/or social identities are reconstituted through global shifts; and (7) articulate a commitment to being a responsible global citizen, that is, a form of cosmopolitan citizenship that emphasizes collective wellbeing connected across local, national, and global dimensions.
