# **COURSE DESCRIPTION / PRINCIPAL TOPICS**

This course introduces students to the varied perspectives and countless voices that shaped the complex history of the German culture. Through surveying the major milestones of German cinema and reading German lyric poetry, students generate an understanding of the key roles of literary voices, historical events, and political notions shaping Germany's difficult past and present development toward more heterogeneous, cosmopolitan, and multicultural ideals. Whenever a film is based on a literary work, it will be read alongside its film version for comparative purposes. The class meetings consist of lectures, film screenings, class discussions, and group work.

Participation in the discussions of the films is of utmost importance. There will be a short quiz each week on Friday, a group oral presentation, two short response papers, a midterm paper, and a final essay.

### **COMMENTS**

This course has three functions:

- introduction to German film with English subtitles and German lyric poetry in dual language
- introduction to how film was a forum for both working through Germany's difficult past, as well as reflecting on the complexities of its history
- introduction to basic film and literary terms necessary to the understanding of how German cinema transitioned from silent to sound film, and the aesthetic dimensions of the artistic medium in question
