Course Description

This edition of Italian Women Writers examines the delayed emergence and rapidly increasing presence of women writers/directors in the Italian film industry. Historically, Italian women have been highly productive as screenwriters, yet mostly unknown to the public. While acknowledging the importance of Lilliana Cavani and Lina Wertmuller who succeeded in directing their own screenplays in the late 20th century, the course focuses mainly on the activity of contemporary women writers/directors. Attentive to the social, political, and cultural circumstances in which they emerged, we examine how their work has challenged traditional assumptions about family, gender, class, race and nation.

Student Learning Outcomes

Having successfully completed the required work students will

- 1. Understand the distinctive challenges faced by women writers and directors in Italy.
- 2. Deploy interdisciplinary approaches in the final research paper.
- 3. Demonstrate the skill of orally presenting the close analysis of a film clip.
- 4. Identify how the work of women writers and filmmakers challenge traditional assumptions about family, gender, class, race and nation.
