COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS

A course intended for students who have not taken French before. Taking a communicative approach, the course emphasizes reading, writing, and oral proficiency in basic French. Materials covered include an introduction to all articles, pronouns, regular and irregular verbs in present and past tenses, pronominal verbs, interrogative structures, adjectives, prepositions, and basic vocabulary, all presented in relevant cultural contexts.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will have:

- acquired a knowledge of basic French grammar and vocabulary
- developed communicative skills in oral, aural and written French
- gained a deeper insight into French and francophone cultures.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: French 2 is a continuation of French 1. This course takes a communicative approach to teach cultural materials and structures necessary for you to further develop the basics of oral and written communication in French. You will learn to talk about your childhood memories, everyday life, the future, France and the francophone world, health and happiness, and love and friendship.

We will speak (almost) only French in class in order to create an immersive linguistic environment. ***You are still not expected to understand every word.*** Try to follow the gist by paying attention to the context. Pick out words you may recognize to piece meaning together. I will use gestures, pantomimes, pictures, and other clues to get the message across. You will find your comprehension increasing as the course progresses. New structures and vocabulary will be presented as they fit into chapter themes. Your daily presence in class is essential to your learning.

Prerequisite: FREN 2101 or by LMU Placement Exam or permission of instructor.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of this course, you will have:

- acquired a knowledge of basic French grammar and vocabulary, including a variety of moods and tenses
- further developed the four communicative skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing in French
- gained a deeper insight into French and francophone cultures
- developed information literacy by properly using reference materials

COURSE DESCRIPTION: In French 3, you will use your linguistic tools to explore the cultures of the francophone world and broaden your own perspective. We begin second-year study assuming that you have been introduced to the basic grammatical structures and vocabulary of French, which we will review, refine, and flesh out through more extensive readings and discussions, further study of grammar, and more interaction with French media, especially films. You will improve your pronunciation through the study of phonetics and practice in class and with the ARC French tutor.

Prerequisite: FREN 2102 (Successful completion of one year of college French) or by LMU Placement Exam or permission of instructor.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of this course, you will have:

- produce increasingly complex sentences
- interpret French and francophone cultures with greater depth and nuance
- produce more natural speech
- exhibit information literacy by properly using reference materials

COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS

Following on the heels of French 3, this course is designed for students who want to pursue upper-division French courses, study abroad, and/or improve their pronunciation in French. The course will offer a revision of grammar, an initiation to French cinema and literature, and detailed practice in French pronunciation.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of this class, diligent students will be able to:

- pronounce French correctly and intelligibly
- demonstrate an understanding of more complex grammar structures in conversation and in writing
- discuss French cinema in French
- read and understand an entire contemporary novel in French
- demonstrate heightened familiarity with diverse French and francophone cultures

COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS

Preparation of a Senior Capstone Project, which consists of a portfolio during the second semester of the senior year. The portfolio is a collection of multiple samples usually compiled over time accompanied by a personal reflection essay which would show that the student has met the objectives in the French major.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Through the portfolio, students will be able to assess:

- their knowledge of the principal aspects of the French language, the French/Francophone cultures, the cultural expressions such as literature, art, social practices, gender and the media of the French-speaking world.
- their understanding of spoken French, their speaking and writing in French and their reading and critical skills in French literature and culture.
- their intercultural awareness.

Second semester of the senior year / Requirements for the French major either completed or completed concurrently with FREN 4990.
