- -Demonstrate adequate culture awareness to function in given settings appropriate to the level of the elementary student

COURSE DESCRIPTION/PRINCIPAL TOPICS:

This course will help students acquire knowledge and perspectives regarding Japan's most popular culture—Manga & Anime. It will explore why Manga and Anime are so popular not only among young Japanese but also among young people worldwide. Furthermore, students will examine Japanese Manga & Anime with a critical eye. The class will give students a chance to read Manga in Japanese and then watch the Anime based on the same stories, also in Japanese. This class provides a window into understanding the culture and lifestyle of the people of Japan.

- -Show intermediate proficiency in the four skills of listening speaking, reading and writing.
