Students are also initiated to the apprenticeship of French pronunciation through phonetics.

Preparation of a Senior Capstone Project, which consists of a portfolio during the second semester of the senior year. The portfolio is a collection of multiple samples usually compiled over time accompanied by a personal reflection essay which would show that the student has met the objectives in the French major.
